# Our Philosophy

# Belief

We believe that responsible, effective philanthropy has the power to uplift communities and eradicate poverty in our lifetimes.

# Purpose

We partner with nonprofits to fund sustainable solutions to poverty.

# Vision

Together with our nonprofit partners we will eliminate poverty within the communities they serve, and set up families and individuals to be resilient in the face of economic, environmental and social challenges over generations.

# Mission

We work to eliminate poverty by providing multi-year, unrestricted grants to vetted nonprofit organizations focusing on improving access to high quality healthcare, education and livelihoods.



#### The Corporate/Philanthropic Relationship

The Cotopaxi Foundation was created out of a desire to formalize and deepen Cotopaxi's longstanding commitment to addressing poverty and supporting communities around the world. As Cotopaxi grew as a certified B Corporation and mission-driven brand, the need for a dedicated philanthropic arm became clear—one that could strategically manage charitable giving, build long-term partnerships, and ensure that impact was as thoughtfully executed as the products Cotopaxi creates. The Foundation allows Cotopaxi to channel a portion of its revenue directly into high-impact initiatives, aligning business success with meaningful social change.

#### The Work

Poverty alleviation and global development can be incredibly complex. There are countless philosophies, many of which can be proven effective or ineffective depending on the lens one uses. We utilize three rather simple concepts to maintain a successful portfolio-research and balance.





#### **Research Backed Decision Making**

Since our founding in 2019 we have leaned on the findings of globally recognized organizations and champions of evidence-based solutions like the Jamil Abdul Lateef Poverty Action Lab (J-PAL) to ensure the interventions we fund are proven to reduce poverty over time if executed correctly. Our funding pillars come directly from recommendations made by both J-PAL and the UN as issue areas with the greatest potential to shift economic outcomes for both individuals and communities. **Education, Healthcare and Livelihoods.** 

While we don't run randomized evaluations ourselves, we apply many of their core principles:



#### **Evidence First**

We prioritize funding approaches that have been proven to work — like education, women's economic empowerment, and community health.



#### **Local Context Matters**

We fund organizations with local leaders who understand what works in their own communities.



#### **Measure What Matters**

We focus on meaningful outcomes, not just outputs, and encourage shared learning over box-checking.



#### **Support Smart Growth**

When programs prove effective, we help partners grow with integrity and sustainability.

We now partner directly with J-PAL to help fund some of the critical research and network building it takes to track interventions over time and ensure their efficacy.

#### Balance

Like our colleagues at Cotopaxi, we take inspiration from the natural world when thinking about our work. When examining the health and success of an ecosystem, scientists often cite balance as a marker for the sustainability of said system. Natural systems are almost always more effective when they are balanced, and we feel similarly about our strategy.

We like to think of our grant portfolio like netting, with each funding track or grantee program being its own individual rope. If we're able to spread the ropes out to different issues and help create links between them, it's much more likely that we'll be able to achieve our goal of lifting without anything falling through the cracks. In this case we can help our partners empower the communities they serve by raising incomes and quality of life from different angles.

#### Trust

While we don't claim to be full adherents of the Trust-Based Philanthropy model, we have been heavily influenced by the philosophy, and many of its principles are deeply embedded in how we work. We believe that those closest to the challenges are also closest to the solutions, and we strive to be a responsive, collaborative, and transparent funding partner. Here's how we bring the spirit of trust-based giving into our relationships:



#### **Multi-Year, Unrestricted Funding**

Long term, flexible funding allows our partners to work unencumbered by arbitrary guidelines, and use their funding, when, how and where they need it most.



#### **Solicit and Act on Feedback**

A newer initiative of ours, we have begun to seek feedback from our grantees and use it to improve our processes.



#### Do the Homework

We conduct our own research to understand a potential partner's track record and impact, rather than asking for lengthy proposals. We believe more paperwork equals less impact.



#### **Support Beyond the Check**

We aim to be thought partners and amplifiers. In addition to funding, we've partnered with grantees on marketing campaigns, introduced supplemental funders and used our employee base as volunteers and mentors.



### Simplified and Streamlined Paperwork/Reporting

Whenever possible, we lean into straightforward agreements and reporting requirements. Utilizing our partners' metrics for success reduces their burden and also helps us better understand their work.



#### **Center Relationships**

Above all, we invest in relationships grounded in mutual respect and humility. We stay in close touch with our partners year-round, not just during grant cycles, and many have become long-term collaborators and friends.



#### **Transparency and Responsiveness**

We communicate openly about our funding priorities, timelines, and challenges and decisions.

This trust-based approach allows us to work in deeper partnership with communities and organizations creating lasting change. It's a work in progress, and we're always learning — together.





Our portfolio is broken down into two funding streams- Core Grants and Community Grants. Each track plays an important role in lifting up communities, expanding impact and growing the "Do Good" movement.






#### **2024 Programmatic Progress**

- → 88% of grantee outcome goals were met, exceeded, or are on track to meet expectations
- → ~12% of desired programmatic outcomes were not met
  - 4% missed due to delayed grant payments (delayed 1% disbursements from Cotopaxi to Cotopaxi Foundation )
- 8% missed due to local programmatic or environmental factors and will be addressed within the continuing cycle

### Working Toward a Dream: Esmeralda's Story

#### **Grantee**

New Story — Etzatlán, Mexico

#### Introduction

New Story is reimagining how housing is financed and built for families in need of safe, permanent shelter. In Etzatlán, Mexico, their innovative model is helping individuals like Esmeralda, a single mother and entrepreneur, take ownership of their future, one home at a time.

#### The Challenge

For years, Esmeralda dreamed of buying land and building a home for herself and her four-year-old son. Although she had worked as a stylist and makeup artist for nearly a decade, the financing options available to her were unaffordable. Instead, she relied on short-term, six-month rental leases that left her in a constant state of uncertainty. What she wanted most was a stable home, something she could one day pass on to her son.

#### The Approach

In 2022, Esmeralda joined New Story's program after learning about it through friends in Etzatlán. From the beginning, she was drawn to the program's transparency and support. Through the initiative, she was able to make manageable payments toward her lot and essential services, a pathway to land ownership that had previously felt out of reach.


By April 2024, Esmeralda had completed her payments and officially became a landowner. With the support of New Story and local partners, she is now working with an architect to design and build her home.

#### The Impact



## Restoring Mobility and Hope: Cristobal's Story

#### **Grantee**

Range of Motion Project (ROMP) — Guatemala

#### Introduction

The Range of Motion Project (ROMP) is dedicated to expanding access to high-quality prosthetic care for underserved populations. Through its Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Program, ROMP is transforming the lives of patients like Cristobal, a 10-year-old boy from rural Guatemala whose journey has become a powerful story of resilience and recovery.

#### **The Challenge**

In December 2022, Cristobal underwent an amputation as part of his treatment for bone cancer. He was referred to ROMP by a physician at the National Pediatric Oncology Hospital while still undergoing intensive chemotherapy. When ROMP first met him, Cristobal was physically weakened and emotionally depleted from his treatment. Without access to prosthetic care, his mobility and independence were at risk.

#### The Approach

Cristobal was selected to participate in ROMP's CBR Program, which offers a holistic model of care by pairing patients with trained "Mobilizers" who provide in-home physical and emotional support. Over the course of several months, Cristobal's Mobilizer visited his home every two weeks to help prepare him both physically and mentally for a prosthesis.

In November 2023, Cristobal received his prosthetic limb at ROMP's clinic following a series of personalized fittings and evaluations. Post-fitting, his Mobilizer continued to support him through home visits, ensuring he gained the confidence and strength to fully adapt to his new mobility.

#### The Impact

Cristobal's mobility has been restored, and he continues to make daily progress. He now dreams of becoming a physician, a reflection of both his determination and the care he received. Cristobal is one of hundreds of patients who have benefited from the CBR Program in Guatemala.



### A Life-Changing Intervention: Magdiel's Story

#### **Grantee**

Mercy Corps — Venezuela

#### Introduction

Mercy Corps is dedicated to alleviating suffering poverty and oppression by building secure, just, and productive communities. In Venezuela, a country with one of the highest maternal mortality rates in Latin America, the organization is addressing critical gaps in maternal health care through its Saving Lives from the Beginning program. With support from Cotopaxi, the program is transforming care for pregnant women, including 27-year-old Magdiel from San José del Río Chico.

#### The Challenge

Magdiel's first pregnancy had been difficult. Venezuela's strained health system and underresourced clinics left many women without access to reliable, high-quality prenatal care. When Magdiel became pregnant again, she knew she needed more support, both medically and emotionally. The Cirila Vega medical center where she sought care was underfunded and lacked basic equipment, with frequent power outages and poor air circulation that compromised patient safety.

#### The Approach

While visiting the clinic, Magdiel overheard a conversation about Saving Lives from the Beginning and inquired about enrolling. Through the program, she received regular prenatal checkups, emotional support, and access to a community of women navigating similar experiences.

At the systems level, Mercy Corps made critical upgrades to the maternity ward at Cirila Vega. Air conditioning was installed throughout the unit, the breastfeeding training room was renovated, and maintenance work was completed on the water and electrical systems. These improvements enhanced both patient care and working conditions for medical staff.

#### The Impact

Magdiel received seven prenatal checkups and consistent, dignified care. She felt like she was surrounded by people who genuinely cared about her welfare and who made her feel completely at ease.

After her baby was born, the support continued. Magdiel received postpartum medical follow-ups throughout the recovery period, further improving the outcomes for her and her child.

Beyond improving her own situation, the program has allowed Magdiel to become an advocate for others. After she shared her positive experience, a friend decided to enroll in the program as well.

As Mercy Corps continues to expand its approach to women's health — integrating climate resilience and systems change — Magdiel looks to the future with optimism. She envisions a healthy life for her daughter and a stable future for her family.



### A Dream Realized: Carmen's Story

#### **Grantee**

Water1st International — Honduras

#### Introduction

Water1st International is working to create a world where no one has to live without clean water and basic sanitation. With support from Cotopaxi, Water1st is bringing this vision to life in Buena Vista, Honduras — a rural community where access to clean water had remained out of reach for years. Thanks to the determination of local residents like Carmen Sanchez and the introduction of new technologies, that is changing.

#### The Challenge

For years, the people of Buena Vista had hoped to build a water system. The community's biggest hurdle was finding a viable spring — a common challenge in high-elevation areas where traditional sources are becoming harder to secure. Without reliable access to water, families, especially women, spent hours each day walking to collect it, often from unsafe sources. The daily burden made it difficult to focus on education, income, or health.

#### The Approach

Recognizing the limitations of spring-fed systems, Water1st began funding drilled wells — a new and promising solution in this region. Buena Vista became one of the first communities to benefit. Once a suitable well was developed, the community sprang into action. On the very first day of construction, Water1st staff joined Carmen and dozens of other residents as they began trenching the first 200 yards of pipeline. While the trenching work is typically done by men, more women — including Carmen — are joining in. Carmen's commitment to the project reflects her determination to see the water system completed as quickly as possible.



#### The Impact

Thanks to the hard work of the Buena Vista community and support from Cotopaxi, the water system is nearly complete. More than four miles of pipeline now bring clean water directly to homes and community centers. Households are also constructing new bathrooms — simple but transformative structures that include a toilet, shower, and utility sink.

For Carmen and the women of Buena Vista, the end of the daily walk for water is more than a convenience — it's a life-changing shift. With clean water at home, families are healthier, women have more time to pursue education and incomegenerating activities, and children can grow up with better opportunities.

The future looks bright for Carmen, her family, and the entire Buena Vista community.



## **Building Confidence and a Future: Omul's Story**

#### Grantee

International Rescue Committee (IRC) — Salt Lake City, Utah

#### Introduction

The International Rescue Committee (IRC) helps people whose lives and livelihoods are shattered by conflict and disaster, including the climate crisis, to survive, recover, and regain control of their future. With a focus on long-term impact, the IRC delivers health care, supports education, and empowers communities around the world, always prioritizing the needs of women and girls.

#### The Challenge

For young refugees and newcomers like Omul Banin, navigating life in a new country can be overwhelming—especially when approaching critical transitions like college. Without strong support systems, students may struggle with the academic, social, and logistical challenges of adjusting to a new environment.

#### The Approach

With support from the Cotopaxi Foundation, the IRC's Success Coaching and Mentoring Program in Salt Lake City paired Omul Banin with a dedicated mentor to support her through her senior year of high school. Together, they set goals around college applications, building friendships, and getting her driver's license. Over nine months, the mentorship focused on essay writing, schoolwork, test preparation, and developing social confidence—equipping Omul Banin with both practical tools and personal encouragement.

#### The Impact

Omul Banin was accepted to Salt Lake Community College and participated in their Summer Bridge Program. She earned her learner's permit, improved her academic skills, and developed greater selfreliance and confidence.

JPAL (supporting School the World)

#### **Focus**

Strengthening early childhood education through evidence-based design

#### What We Supported

With support from J-PAL's incubator and mentorship, School the World refined its early childhood education program, built internal evaluation capacity, and prepared for territorial expansion in Guatemala and Honduras.

#### Why It Matters

Effective early education is critical to long-term poverty reduction — but scaling quality programming in remote areas requires strong design, evidence, and adaptability.

#### **Early Results**

- Redesigned early learning program
- Expanded to new areas in Guatemala and into Honduras
- Strengthened Theory of Change and monitoring indicators

#### **Partner**

Fundación ALIADOS - Ecuadorian Amazon

#### **Focus**

Regenerative agriculture, Indigenous entrepreneurship, and biodiversity conservation

#### What We Supported

Through ALIADOS, the Kichwa-led enterprise HASA received technical support, specialized hives, and mentoring to grow their native bee conservation and honey business — while preserving Amazonian ecosystems.

#### **Why It Matters**

Indigenous-led regenerative businesses like HASA demonstrate how environmental protection and economic opportunity can go hand in hand.

#### **Early Results**

- 1.000+ bee colonies rescued
- 1,200 pollinator plants cultivated
- Honey sales doubled in one year
- New income from eco-tours, cosmetics, and beekeeping supplies

#### **Partner**

OneGoal (Northbrook High School, Houston, TX)

#### **Focus**

Postsecondary advising, college and career readiness

#### **What We Supported**

Northbrook implemented OneGoal's three-year program to support 100+ students with in-school and first-year college advising. The program helped close postsecondary access gaps.

#### **Why It Matters**

Each counselor served 500+ students, limiting advising capacity. OneGoal filled the gap — improving student outcomes and expanding access to future pathways.

#### **Early Results**

- 2x more likely to enroll in postsecondary
- 82% persistence rate
- Program expanded in 2024-2025 to serve more students

#### **Partner**

The Chain Collaborative (Loreto, Ecuador)

#### **Focus**

Community-led development in sustainable agriculture and youth education

#### What We Supported

Through TCC's CLD Incubator, Asoamazonas launched a farmer field school and youth reading club. The initiative trained families in organic coffee production and offered a safe, enriching space for children.

#### Why It Matters

This youth-led organization tackled deep-rooted community challenges through regenerative farming and education — building economic opportunity and social cohesion.

#### **Early Results**

- 15 families trained; 20 received inputs
- 4 farms certified in sustainable practices
- 20% increase in coffee collected
- 17 youth in the after-school literacy program

The number one reason the Cotopaxi Foundation is able to have an impact on the lives of hundreds of thousands of people each year is the adventurous spirit and community mindedness of Cotopaxi customers. Because every single purchase of a product from the Brand generates grantmaking dollars for the Foundation, **Cotopaxi customers truly are the engine behind our impact.** 

We recognize that people can go nearly anywhere to purchase bags or jackets these days, and the fact that our community chooses to spend their hard earned dollars with Cotopaxi shows us that more and more people are committing to conscious consumption.

BUT

Our community goes above and beyond... Did you know that our customers directly contribute to the work of our partners, beyond the 1% they generate through purchasing our products?

Cotopaxi customers donate thousands of dollars a month to our Foundation allowing us to do even more than we could on our own. 100% of all donations made through cotopaxi.com go directly to fund multi-year grants, allowing for our customers to make true, long term impact.

#### **Now More Than Ever, Your Support Matters**

As global crises escalate, many international aid organizations, including our partners the International Rescue Committee, Mercy Corps, and United to Beat Malaria, are facing unprecedented challenges due to sweeping cuts in federal funding.
